Book Reviews





She soon comes across the monstrous Creakers. Don't worry though, they're pretty much buffoons and Lucy has some clever plans and tricks!

Why is it so important for my child to read every day?

Reading for pleasure makes a huge difference to a child's educational performance. Evidence suggests that children who read regularly not only perform better in reading tests than those who don't, but also develop a broader vocabulary, increased general knowledge and a better understanding of other cultures. In fact, reading for pleasure is more likely to determine whether a child does well at school than their social or economic background. Please help your child to practise their reading at home little and often. Just 10 minutes every day makes such a big difference!


